Pupil Voice Initiative - Success!

Our Year 5 pupils entered their pitch to secure funding from The Green Dragons Den, an initiative set up by Camden Learning, Camden 'Think & Do' and the Camden Climate Alliance. Pupils in year 4 and 5 across Camden were given the opportunity to come up with an idea for a sustainability project in their school. Our pupils in Year 5 created a video presentation on two problems in our school: maintaining our garden and reducing food waste. In their video they presented the idea of creating a gardening club that will take care of our school's garden and greenhouse, cleaning it up and preparing it for new seedlings and plants in return for being able to eat outside in the garden or on the roof garden. And they won £500! Well done 5 Quartz for providing an excellent example of taking responsibility and making a positive contribution to the school.

London Zoo trip

Last week Thursday and Friday Year 1 pupils visited London Zoo. Children took part in a 'hands on' workshop where they had to categorise the animals by exploring their skin. Most of these were endangered species and were given to the zoo by the police. The children used tape measures and magnifiers to investigate further. Finally, they matched words and pictures to each animal.



Visit to a Gallery

On Tuesday 1 Ruby visited The October Gallery and 1 Jade visited on Thursday. Golnaz Fathi is the current artist who is being exhibited at the gallery. The children first matched a close up of different art pieces and then found one they liked the most and gave reasons for why they thought it was the best. Eventually the children created three different art pieces inspired by Golnaz Fathi.

in King's Cross.



In King's Cross, we see about 60 cars per minute but in Bonsall it's more like three per minute. -Tayyabah








My favourite part was when we ran up a volcano. We also found volcanic rocks and brought them home. - Aaliyah

On Monday Years 3 and 5 each had a workshop with the London Children's Ballet .They started by watching a film to learn a bit more about the performers and also the basic steps of ballet. The film was all in French! This was followed by a simple lesson in ballet technique, including the starting positions of arms and legs. After that they learned some small sections from Snow White, which they had watched the previous Thursday. They learned how ballet dancers tell the story through dance steps, gesture and mime. They applied that learning to different emotions and when playing the Raven, the sidekick of the Evil Queen and the Dove who looked after Snow White throughout the story.





EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Reception

In the final week before the half term holiday, the children in Reception have been learning about food and where it comes from. They discussed farms and the types of animals that live there. They learnt that different items come from farms, such as milk, cheese, eggs, bread and even wool to make clothes. Following this, the children read the story of 'The Little Red Hen' and discussed the moral behind the tale. They used words such as unhelpful and selfish to describe the characters in the story that did not help the Little Red Hen, and the

describe the characters in the story that did not help the Little Red Hen, and then talked how it is important to be helpful.

Also this week, the children went on a school trip to London Zoo where they were able to see a range of farm animals such as goats, sheep and horses, as well as a range of animals

from around the world.

EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Nursery

This week the children in Nursery travelled over to the continent of North America to learn about some of the animals that live there such as beavers, alligators, eagles, racoons and brown bears. After looking at images of these animals, the children listened to the story of 'We're going on a Bear Hunt.' This is a classic Early Years text as it encourages children to act out the story and join in with the repetitive language.

As a key character in the tale is a brown bear, the children spent time this week learning more about these predators; including describing their features and identifying similarities and differences between brown bears and other bears (like polar bears and panda bears).

On Friday, the children and their parents worked together to go on their very own bear hunt. They searched around the nursery setting for pictures of different bears

before sorting them onto a table and counting the number of each type that they had found. Our Friday morning 'Stay and Play' sessions are extremely beneficial as they allow parents to have a deeper understanding of the learning that the children do, as well as encouraging a dialogue between home and school. Please try to stay and play next term if possible nursery parents.
