Can you make it look like you are shaking hands, without touching? Can you make a shadow like a three-headed monster? Nusaybah: yes, you can overlap your bodies and


Nusaybah: yes, you can overlap your bodies and block the sun.

This week, we were awarded a certificate to acknowledge the participation of our parents, pupils and staff in the CHILL study.



EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Reception

Last week the children had been designing and planning their own bridges. This week the children had the opportunity to create their designs using a range of different materials in order to see if their design was appropriate or needed further refining. The children learnt that designing and evaluating buildings and structures is a key aspect of being an architect.

As part of the unit on exploring structures the children went on a trip to central London where they walked along the River Thames and identified a range of different structures.



EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Nursery

Having now explored all the continents, the children in Nursery went to learn about the oceans. They learnt that an ocean is a big body of water but it is different from lakes, ponds and rivers. The children shared their prior knowledge of animals that live in the oceans with their peers before going on to learn about Coral Reefs. After listening to the story 'Over in the ocean—in a



coral reef' by Marianne Berkes, the children discussed the range of animals that live in the reef including pufferfish, needlefish, stingrays and seahorses and used a range of adjectives to describe them.



As part of their stay and play session this week, the children used a range of materials such as plasticine,



googly eyes and sticks to create their own sea creatures that live in the coral reef.
