history and find out about when they lived and what they achieved. On Tuesday Year 2 had a great time exploring habitats and observing seasonal changes at Highgate Woods. They enjoyed a sensory walk and took notes of what they could see, hear, smell, feel and taste to prepare them for their diary writing task. #### Year 3's learning this week





In PSHE we looked at how our choices of food and drinks can have an impact on our teeth. The children ranked a number of familiar drinks by their sugar content, before discovering that they could have up to 17 teaspoons of sugar in the case of one energy drink.

such as operating on a brain, looking at the size of particles, finding out how a pulse oxometer works, making patterns with their breath, green solutions, producing electricity from water to heat up a popcorn machine,



### Year 1's learning this week

Also, this week Year 1 went to the London Canal Museum to learn why canals were built, who built them and how they were used. The children took part in three different activities: a boat ride down the canal to Angel going through a long dark tunnel; dressing up and 'living' in a canal boat & finding out about the different cargoes transported on canal boats.



#### Special food

Year 1 looked at the harvest celebration of British produce and made crudities with hummus and guacamole. In Design Technology the children learnt how to peel vegetables using a peeler, to grate using a grater, to chop and slice using a knife and how to hold the vegetables and the equipment safely. Each part of their crudity was a different part of a plant that we eat, e.g. lettuce (leaf), cucumber & tomato (fruit), celery (stem), carrot (root) and sweetcorn (seed).

### **EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Reception**


This week the children in Reception have continued reading the story of 'Handa's Surprise' and learning to recite the text using key actions. As the children have been exploring the Savannah (the location of the text), they have also been looking at a range of maps. Using these as a guide, the children have been making their own maps noting key features in their environment. Whilst completing a puzzle of the Savannah, the children have been working on their communication and turn taking skills. A key skill of the Early years curriculum.

Also this week, the children have been developing their hand eye coordination by playing a range of throwing and catching ball games. The focused physical education lessons with specialist coaches have supported the children in becoming more competent. Alongside this, the children have been practising their letter formations so that they can apply their knowledge of phonics to their

### **Our development matters**

#### Maths:

In maths this week, the children have been exploring the concept of fewer and more. You can help your child to understand this concept by using these words at home. For example 'I have have more ... than you. You have fewer ... than me.'

#### Literacy:

The children have continued to create their own story maps using the story of Handa's Surprise as their starting point. The children have been writing the first letter for each animal in the story.

#### Understanding the World:

This week the children have been exploring maps of the Savannah and trying to find Africa on a globe. They have also been looking at a range of books on African animals and learning interesting facts about animals such as 'Flamingo's live in mud' and 'Cheetah's run as fast as a car.'



## **EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Nursery**


The focus nursery rhyme for this week has been 'Twinkle, twinkle, little star'. The children began the week by singing the nursery rhyme and then talked about why the rhyme refers to stars twinkling like a diamond. They learnt that stars appear to look tiny from far away but actually they are big balls of fire and the nearest star to Earth is the sun. They then learnt that Earth is also the same shape but as we are on it, we can't see the shape of it. The children pretended to climb into a rocket and fly off into space. They used Google maps to support their learning by zooming further and further out of their location, talking about all the different things that they could see such as roads, land, sea and clouds. Following this, the children learnt that Earth is one of eight planets in the solar system, and that we don't yet know if there is life on the other planets. They listened to the story of the week, 'Beegu' - a story on an alien who lands on Earth after its rocket breaks and



then needs help finding his way back home. The children thought about how Beegu might be feeling and then chose items that they thought they would need to take in their rocket in order to help Beegu find his home. The children practised using words such as 'first, then, next and finally' in order to help them retell the story.

#### **Personal, Social and Emotional Development:**

The children thought about the feelings of themselves and of others by exploring Beegu's feelings at different parts of the story. They then read the text, 'Whatever Next' and talked about how dad felt when he was unable to get to sleep.

#### **Physical Development:**

The children practised their cutting skills by cutting out stars to stick in the night sky. They then practised their gross motor skills by going on moon walks.

#### **Expressive Art and Design:**

The children created their own alien pictures and then tried to paint a portrait of Beegu.
