Maths at Argyle - How you can see and support progress

This year we will be working hard to focus on improving our arithmetic skills as we know that pupils with good number sense are able to access and solve more challenging reasoning problems. In order to help our pupils develop swift arithmetic recall we will be completing a daily arithmetic workout. Pupils will have up to 15 questions (fewer for younger pupils) to answer and will then be taught strategies to help them improve. Once a week pupils will complete a low-stakes quiz and we will send the quizzes home in homework books so that parents can work with their children to help them improve. Our main goal is to see an improvement in the scores so that pupils can see that they are making progress with their learning.



Home Learning at Argyle makes a difference

Our home learning policy has been developed to keep pupils learning and engaged when at home as home learning plays an important part in supporting a child's school education. When the home learning policy is followed by a pupil and is reinforced by parents, pupils can expect to make great progress at school.



Home learning will be required of all pupils from Reception to Year 6. Home learning will be sent home every Thursday and should be returned on Tuesday unless otherwise stated.

The Home Learning Policy will be shared with you in detail on Parenthub and in Welcome meetings. Please ensure your child is supported to complete their home learning.

Year 3 begin Garden Classroom lessons

On Wednesday and Thursday this week, Year 3 had their first experience of the Garden Classroom. Each week they will go out and discover more about what lives and grows in our school garden. They will tend to the plants and make it a wonderful place to visit. They will also have opportunities to cook outside and enjoy outdoor crafts.

This week they started by making 3 stranded bracelets to remind them of a promise:

Red: to take care of themselves

Yellow: to look after each other

Green: to take care of nature and their environment



They then used tools to bore out the centre of a small piece of wood from the elder tree, which they threaded on as beads.



Year 3 learn about Timelines

The children started their research into Prehistoric Britain by visiting our giant timeline in the playground. They located some events in history with which they were already familiar such as the Great Fire of London and the Crimean War in which Florence Nightingale worked as a nurse. They found out that all those events were quite close together, while people first lived in Britain in the Neolithic period 900,000 years ago!



We then used what we knew to make a human timeline of our own.

An era is a different stage of time. There was the Victorian era from 1820–1901, then Edwardian era 1901– 1914 then the Elizabethan 2 era from 1962– 2022. I don't know what this new era is called.


Year 2 Art

EYFS at Argyle Primary School

Autumn Term Week 1

16th September 2022

Welcome to the EYFS section of the newsletter. Each week we will be sharing with you the exciting learning that is taking place in the Reception and Nursery classes in order to help you support their language, reading, writing and mathematical development at home.

In Reception the children are undertaking a journey of exploration in a year wide theme entitled **'We are Explorers'**. They have begun this unit by thinking about themselves and their families. The children will be talking about

their families, heritage and things that enjoy doing.

They began the week by reading the texts **'So Much'** and **'Owl Babies'**. The children talked about the people in their lives who are special to them and the reasons why they are special. They then sequenced the story of owl babies and tried to retell the story in their own words.

As the children are still settling into Reception it is important that they learn the routines of the classroom. Parents can help with this by modelling positive behaviours such as sharing, tidying up and using kind words.

Our development matters

Literacy:

Pupils are developing their fine motor control by learning the correct way to hold a writing tool. They have been provided with many different writing opportunities in the environment. You can help your child by supporting them to write their own names.

Mathematics:

The children have been learning about counting by singing a range of counting songs such as 1, 2, 3, 4, 5. Once I saw a fish alive. Practising counting to ten and beyond will lay a good foundation for their mathematical development this year.



Personal, Social and Emotional Development:

Pupils have been painting pictures of people who are special to them. They have thought about features (e.g. eyes, mouth, nose) that they need to add to their paintings. They have also had the opportunity to tell their classmates about their families.




EYFS at Argyle Primary School

Autumn Term Week 1

16th September 2022

This week in Nursery, the children are settling into the environment and getting to know the adults and friends that will support them this year. For some children, this transition is quick and easy but for others, this requires a more gradual approach. It is our goal to help children see the nursery as an exciting place to be. You can help your child at home by talking about the fun activities that they can do there. In Nursery this year, the children will become adventurers. They will explore a range of lands and themes but have begun by exploring nursery rhymes. This weeks nursery rhyme is **'Row, row, row your boat'**. The children have sung the song on a daily basis alongside a range of other common nursery rhymes. Singing regularly with your child helps to set the foundations for their reading. The children then learnt more about boats and water. They explored different types of water such as puddles, rain, lakes, seas and talked about how boats help us travel across water. They role played

being in their own boats and rowing them across the sea.

Also this week, the children have been exploring the season of Autumn. They talked about how the weather changes in Autumn and begins to become colder. They explored different changes in nature such as leaves

turning golden and beginning to fall off trees.

Physical Development:

The children have been developing their fine motor skills by cutting out images of different types of boats. They have also played with playdoh in order to develop strength in their hands and fingers.

Personal, Social & Emotional Development:

The children have been naming their body parts and then trying to write labels. They have also been collecting items from the playground to add to their collection of Autumnal objects.



Children between the ages of 3 and 5 should be getting 10 – 11 hours of sleep. Is your child going to bed early enough? Sleep helps brains learn!
